

## K-12 Laptop Roll Out

In coordination and collaboration with the Teaching & Learning and HR divisions to directly support core initiatives, these deployments support pedagogy and curriculum, in particular the Washington State Education Technology Standards and the district's Principles of Effective Digital Learning that support our two instructional frameworks: **Charlotte Danielson's A Framework for Teaching** and a pyramid of pedagogical knowledge based on the **Skillful Teacher from Research for Better Teaching, Inc.**

### 2018 WASHINGTON K-12 EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY STANDARDS

- **Empowered Learner** - Students leverage technology to take an active role in choosing, achieving and demonstrating competency in their learning goals, informed by the learning sciences.
- **Digital Citizen** - Students recognize the rights, responsibilities and opportunities of living, learning and working in an interconnected digital world, and they act and model in ways that are safe, legal and ethical.
- **Knowledge Constructor** - Students critically curate a variety of resources using digital tools to construct knowledge, produce creative artifacts and make meaningful learning experiences for themselves and others.
- **Innovative Designer** - Students use a variety of technologies within a design process to identify and solve problems by creating new, useful or imaginative solutions.
- **Computational Thinker** - Students develop and employ strategies for understanding and solving problems in ways that leverage the power of technological methods to develop and test solutions.
- **Creative Communicator** - Students communicate clearly and express themselves creatively for a variety of purposes using the platforms, tools, styles, formats and digital media appropriate to their goals.
- **Global Collaborator** - Students use digital tools to broaden their perspectives and enrich their learning by collaborating with others and working effectively in teams locally and globally.

### THE PRINCIPLES OF EFFECTIVE DIGITAL LEARNING

- **Principle 1:** Digital resources promote student achievement for all students, especially historically underserved students, when students use them to produce information rather than passively consume information, but technology use alone is ineffective unless mediated by a skillful teacher
- **Principle 2:** Digital resources help teachers develop authentic learning opportunities that align with the depth of rigor of college-and-career ready standards and are relevant and meaningful to students
- **Principle 3:** Digital resources have and continue to change what “literacy” and “being literate” mean and look like
- **Principle 4:** Digital resources can help but alone are insufficient for helping students authentically engage in learning
- **Principle 5:** Digital resources allow students and teachers to connect and collaborate with other students, teachers and other influential adults, and with the content
- **Principle 6:** Digital resources provide opportunities for students to demonstrate mastery of learning goals in a variety of ways
- **Principle 7:** Digital resources allow teachers and students to monitor progress towards learning goals

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### GRADES 9-12 1-1 ROLL OUT

High Schools will provide a computer to all ninth-grade students beginning in 2019-2020 phasing out the cart model over four years. High-need high schools will have an accelerated roll out to meet equity goals. Franklin, Rainier Beach, Chief Sealth, and Seattle World School will join Cleveland and South Lake with grades 9-12 having 1-1 next year. Lincoln will open 1-1 with it's incoming 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade. Interagency will be 1-1 with its students in grade 9-12. In schools getting laptops for 9<sup>th</sup> grade only, the remaining carts will remain and used by grades 10-12 and we will add each incoming 9<sup>th</sup> grade over the next 4 years.

Prior to devices being deployed, schools will need to develop a readiness plan for technology management and family, teacher, and student readiness. The Digital Learning team is developing training materials to aid in the planning. These will be provided prior to start of school during SLI.

Deployment of devices to the equity focused schools will be in September and October; the remaining 9th graders will receive devices between November and February. We will work with schools with 9<sup>th</sup> grade deployments in the Fall on their readiness plans.

Throughout the deployment, support from Digital Learning Specialists, Technical Support Specialists and, in a limited way, the new Educational Technologists will ensure staff have the professional development needed to ensure student success.
